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As the events of the Holocaust recede further into the realm of history, and the number of survivors left to tell their stories dwindle, there is concern that the Holocaust will simply become a story of mass death and destruction. By personalizing the study of the Holocaust with the voices of its victims, students will eschew forever the role of bystander and realize that we have individual responsibilities towards our fellow citizens, regardless of their ethnicity, gender religion, ability or gender.

State-Wide Educational Program

Since its inception in 2003, the Birmingham Holocaust Education Committee (BHEC), a regional division of the Alabama Holocaust Commission (AHC), has focused its efforts on education. With the help of our generous supporters as well as our tireless volunteers, the BHEC has achieved great successes. Now, in November, the AHC will be embarking on its first, state-wide education program. We will reach areas of our state that have little or no access to knowledge of the events of Holocaust and the lessons to be learned from this cataclysmic event. We are bringing author/historian Alexandra Zapruder to Alabama.

Community Lecture & Teacher Workshops

Ms. Zapruder will present a Community Lecture as well as a Teacher Workshop in Monroeville, Montgomery, Birmingham, and Florence. **On Wednesday, November 18, 7:00 pm, Temple Emanu-El in Birmingham will graciously host her lecture. This event is free and open to the public.**

Then on Thursday, November 19, Temple Emanu-El will once again host a full day Holocaust teacher workshop.

In an effort to encourage teachers to attend during these difficult economic times, they will receive reimbursement for their substitute teachers, as well as copies of Ms. Zapruder's book and DVD.

As the AHC received no state funding this year, support for this important program is actively being pursued at the local and state level. BHEC's traveling exhibit *Darkness Into Life* is 'home' and is presently displayed on the walls of the BHEC office. *Darkness Into Life* had a hugely successful two month exhibition in Gadsden this past spring. It was viewed by several thousand people, and over 20 programs were presented in conjunction with the exhibit. A *Gadsden Times*' article reported stories told by Aisic and Riva Hirsch and relayed responses of some of the students they touched. One middle school student was quoted in the article as saying, "It didn't feel completely real when we studied it. But when you listen to survivors, it makes it sound more real and it feels a little bit more strange that someone actually did that."

Community Impact

The impact on that community was huge and the knowledge gained about the Holocaust was tremendous. This is exactly what Becky Seitel and Mitzi Levin, the creators of the exhibit envisioned when they developed the idea of *Darkness Into Life*, to create an educational project which would feature photography and artwork depicting memories of the survivors. The initial exhibit debuted in April 2007 with 13 survivor stories; in 2008 it was expanded to represent the stories of 20 survivors from Alabama.

ABOUT ALEXANDRA ZAPRUDER

Alexandra Zapruder

Ms. Zapruder began her career as the researcher for the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum's exhibition for young visitors, "Remember the Children, Daniel's Story." After the museum opened, she became the Assistant Director of the Oral History Department, working with Holocaust survivors to record their testimonies. In 1992, she began researching and collecting diaries written by young people during the Holocaust. She found stirring stories of adolescents whose lives were changed forever by their Holocaust experience. She related these stories in her book, Salvaged Pages: Young Writers' Diaries of the Holocaust. This book was the winner of the 2001-02 National Jewish Book Award in the Holocaust category. In 2005, the book was made into a DVD, also produced by Ms.

Zapruder, and entitled "I'm Still Here: Real Diaries of Young People Who Lived During the Holocaust." This video was nominated for two Emmy Awards in Editing and Outstanding Historical Programming and was winner of the Jewish Image Award for Best Television Special by the National Foundation for Jewish Culture.
