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On April 1, 2007, *Darkness into Life: The Birmingham Area Holocaust Survivors Through Photography and Art* by Becky Seitel and Mitzi J. Levin opened at the Levite Jewish Community Center in Birmingham, Alabama, and depicted the lives of nine Holocaust survivors from the Birmingham area. The art and photography dealt with different stages of their experiences. Mitzi's paintings focused on life before and during imprisonment or hiding, as well as escape or liberation. Becky's photographs told stories about the survivors' lives today as well as their Holocaust experiences depicted in a photojournalistic style.

State-wide Endeavor

Since then, the exhibit has grown to become a state-wide endeavor and currently includes twenty Holocaust survivors living throughout Alabama in Birmingham, Huntsville, Montgomery, Mobile, and Opelika. Newly-created survivor biographies and maps provide an additional historical dimension to the exhibit. The format for sharing the survivors' experiences continues the original format: art and photography depicting the stages of their experiences...all different...all important to the story of the Holocaust.

Expanded Exhibit

The Birmingham Holocaust Education Committee (BHEC) is pleased to announce the premier of the expanded exhibit: *Darkness into Life: Alabama Holocaust Survivors through Photography and Art*. The exhibit will be on display at the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute, Odessa Woolfolk Gallery, Sunday, September 7 – Sunday, October 26. The opening reception will be Sunday, September 7 from 2:00 – 5:00 p.m. with a brief ceremony at 2:30 p.m.

Education comes in many shapes and forms, particularly with respect to Holocaust Education. First and foremost we seek to educate students. To teach the history, but more importantly, to teach the lessons of the Holocaust. Reaching the students is a multi-pronged approach.

Teach the Teachers

We must teach the teachers who teach the students. This summer the BHEC was fortunate to be able to send three teachers to national Holocaust education workshops. Peter Sanders from Berry Middle School attended the Alfred Lerner Fellowship program of the Jewish Foundation for the Righteous. Lisa Byrd and Ann Mollengarden attended *Facing History and Ourselves*. All shared their experiences at a teacher reception on August 5 and will continue to share with other teachers through the BHEC Teacher Cadre. Scholarships were sponsored by a generous grant from the Frank and Fred Friedman Fund.

Resource for Teachers and Communities

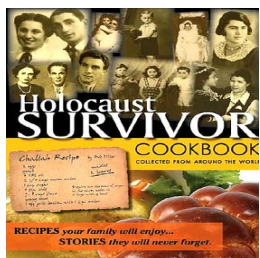
We must be a resource for teachers and communities. To that end, we were able to arrange for the Cullman City Schools to host ADL's Multimedia Curriculum on the *Holocaust: Echoes & Reflections*. This will be a one-day workshop on September 26. In addition, during the month of October, the Huntsville Multicultural Center will host the BHEC's "Courage to Care" poster exhibit as part of a teaching workshop.

Create Long-Term Teaching Materials

We must create long-term teaching materials. Two new BHEC Powerpoints are now on our website: "A Basic Guide to Judaism" and "Hitler's Rise to Power." The BHEC Powerpoints have been a powerful, one-stop tool for classroom teachers.

Visit Expanded Darkness into Life Exhibit at BCRI

And speaking of long-term teaching materials, we hope you will visit the expanded "Darkness into Life" exhibit at the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute in September/October. There are new biographies of the survivors as well as new maps to enhance this expanded, state-wide exhibit. We are working on booking the exhibit throughout the state. It is already booked at the Mary G. Hardin Center for the Cultural Arts in Gadsden for March and April 2009.

Holocaust education in our city, and yes, our state, has been revolutionized by the most profound Art and Photographic exhibit, DARKNESS INTO LIFE, a project conceived and executed by artist, Mitzi J. Levin and photographer, Becky Seitel. This exhibit was viewed by over 5,000 people when it was displayed at the Levite Jewish Community Center, Cullman Middle School and the Old Supreme Court Library in the State Capitol Building in Montgomery. The ripple effect from this viewing has created venues, now in the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute and next spring in Gadsden, in connection with the Gadsden Cultural Arts Center's "Big Read" program, centering on a Holocaust novel, 'The Shawl' by Cynthia Ozick.

Opening the Door for Wider Holocaust Education

In the countless hours Mitzi and Becky spent interviewing Birmingham Holocaust survivors, and now traveling to visit Holocaust survivors throughout the state, in their gentle and sensitive questioning they have extracted the essence of each of the survivor's lives. Mitzi and Becky have brought these images to us in the work of their hands. Convinced that their experiences must be known and never forgotten, they have given us this treasure for remembrance. The DARKNESS INTO LIFE exhibit has opened the door wider for Holocaust education.

PowerPoint Program

To capture that interest, a group of educators, Ann

Mollengarden, the Education Coordinator for BHEC, along with two high school teachers, Lisa Byrd of Mortimer-Jordan High School and Randy Hubbard of Springville High School, have created a PowerPoint program, entitled "The Holocaust". Recently, a teacher who attended a summer international workshop impressed his colleagues with his knowledge and understanding of the Holocaust. He credited the information in this PowerPoint and the general information on our webpage with fortifying his interest, knowledge and enthusiasm in teaching his students. He said, "You just do not realize the impact this program is having." Recently, Ann completed a section on a basic guide to Judaism to add to the PowerPoint program, and soon, a section on anti-Semitism will be added. UNIVERSITY OF MONTEVALLO REMEMBRANCE DAY SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 22 & 23, 2008

The University of Montevallo will "honor the bravery of the United States military from the Second World War and recognize the indomitable spirit of the survivors of the Holocaust" in a program to be held on October 21 - October 22, 2008 at the university. Chaired by Dr. Randall Scott, Professor of Communication Arts, a committee, including a number of university departments and a representative of the Birmingham Holocaust Education Committee, has completed plans for the two-day event.

Dr. Phillip C. Williams Introduces Daily Programs

Each day the program will open with an introduction by President, University of Montevallo, Dr. Phillip C. Williams. A panel featuring history faculty, veterans of both

the Atlantic and Pacific theaters, and a representative of Rosie the Riveters Association will provide discussion of World War II events in which they were involved. Helena Lubel, Birmingham, a member of the Birmingham Holocaust Education Committee, will participate, representing Rosie the Riveters. Dr. Fran Carter, founder of Rosie the Riveters, will discuss her work at an aircraft factory during World War II.

Holocaust Educators and Academics Featured

Following a luncheon, a second panel will feature Holocaust educators and academicians in Holocaust studies. Janie Hubbard, Professor in the Department of Education, who recently attended special training for faculty in higher education institutions sponsored by the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, will chair the first day's Holocaust panel. Ann Mollengarden, Education Coordinator, Birmingham Holocaust Education Committee, is also a member of the panel. Survivors who will discuss their experiences as concentration camp survivors are Jack Bass, Adamsville and Max Steinmetz, Birmingham.

The Birmingham Holocaust Education Committee will sponsor a series of foreign films on a variety of topics dealing with the Holocaust and its effects on both the victims and the societies of the countries in which it took place.

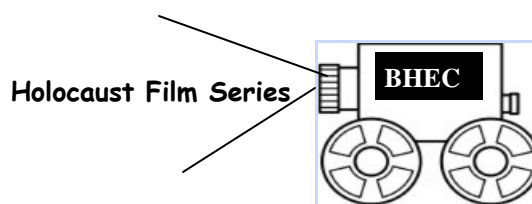
